"We're doing it by ourselves for ourselves."

The development of the Hunter Disability Service Organisation (DSO) has been supported through funding PDCN received from the Federal Government's Practical Design Fund, and hosted by the *Physical Disability Council NSW*, *In Control Australia* and *Resourcing Families*. The experience will be documented to create a record of learning for establishing DSOs in other areas of Australia.

The decision to establish the Hunter DSO came from a local event for people with disability, their family and allies last November. In just two months there were more than 20 members in a local working group who meet fortnightly, with a growing number of people interested in being involved.

The working group is currently focusing on defining key values, functions and what they hope the DSO will achieve.

Upcoming workshop

The Hunter DSO will be holding workshops throughout March in the lead up to the NDIS. Leading a good life; goals and aspirations, individualised funding and what is needed to ensure people with disability have voice choice and control.

National Disability Insurance Scheme

On 6 December 2012 the NSW and Australian Governments reached agreement that fully establishes the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) across NSW from July 2018. The agreement ensures that all people with disability across NSW will have access to a scheme, based on insurance principles, that guarantees lifetime coverage for the cost of reasonable and necessary care and support.

Work towards the NDIS sits alongside *Stronger Together 2*. The implementation of *Stronger Together 2*, and the associated review of disability laws, will ensure NSW models key elements of individual choice and control and reform which underpin the NDIS.

How can you contribute?

To inform the development of new disability legislation, many people will have ideas to share. They include, but are not limited to:

- people with disability, their families and carers
- service providers
- advocates
- peak disability and representative organisations
- government departments, local government and community agencies.

The NSW Government is interested in hearing from as many people and groups as possible and welcome all contributions. There are several ways you can contribute, through either a face to face consultation session or written feedback.

Consultation sessions have been arranged for both regional and metropolitan areas. Each session will run for 2.5 hours and include up to 40 participants: Consultations sessions are below

Why Mentors Matter ?

ABS statistics on the education of those with a physical disability, show 30% of participants had completed year 12 and only 13% had completed a bachelor degree or higher. This is compared to 49% and 20% for people without a disability. For some high school students with physical disability it can be difficult to: recognise their own attributes and skills; see academic opportunities, and future employment opportunities; identify people who can be role models

What ?

Mentoring is about relationships based on encouragement, constructive comments, openness, mutual trust, respect, and a willingness to learn and share. Mentoring elements include:

Supporting the student with individual goal setting

Assisting the student to appreciate the connection between tertiary education and employment

Explaining to the student the opportunities that the mentor perused in achieving their goals

Transferring knowledge in such areas as critical thinking, responsibility, flexibility, gaining support and resilience

Mentors?

Professional people who happen to have physical disability: Each Mentor has completed high school, tertiary education, and is employed. Each Mentor is known to this organisation Each Mentor will have appropriate checks completed Each Mentor will have completed a training session regarding the role of a Mentor
